the present war he was immediately promoted Major of the Third Battalion, Fourth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, commanding Companies G, B, C and F. The Major is a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and of the Society of the War of 1812. His noble blood has been represented in every war of this country. His father was an officer of Artillery in the Prussian Army. His paternal grandfather was an adjutant under Napoleon Bonaparte. The Major has *work* to sustain his name, but the Major has the *enterprise* to make easy that work.

The Boys of The Regiment.
